As the vestry interviews candidates and does the work we have been given to do, we commence and end with this prayer. We also have prayed for clarity. Pilgrimage to the Holy Land – Trip with Father Bob, Mother Liza, and Members of St. Peter's







My reasons for joining in on the pilgrim trip to the Holy Land were varied, but mainly focused on going somewhere that I had never been, and having the shared experience with friends. What I experienced was so much more than what I expected that it is a bit difficult to focus on one or two things that stood out. Certainly, visiting Shepherd's Field, the Church of the Nativity, the Dome of the Rock, the Western Wall, the Garden of Gethsemane, and the Church of the Holy Sepulchre were not to be missed experiences that I will remember for a very long time. Swimming in the Sea of Galilee was also a real treat. I think, however, what touched me the most was our celebrating Eucharist in the Desert (Wadi Qelt) at dawn and then two days later going to church at St. Paul's in Shefa-Amer, where we participated in a bi-lingual English-Arabic Service. The joy of singing a well known hymn in English while the people next to me were singing the same hymn in Arabic was life changing. The final aspect I did not expect was learning about the politics in Israel and the two-class society, which we have no idea of unless we go there. This is one trip everyone should try and take once in their life.

The Key is our main outreach program at St. Peter's Church. It has been for many years. But, what does this mean? Outreach programs are part of a church's mission. The Episcopal dictionary describes "mission" as "the sending forth to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ. The authority for Christian mission is based in Christ and known through the power of the Holy Spirit. Christian mission is understood to be a response to Jesus' command for his disciples to "go and make disciples."

The Key explains its mission as "being humbled to be able to support local organizations whose missions align with our own. As a store which exists to help alleviate suffering in the community, we will prioritize those requests which also focus on basic human needs. This includes but is not limited to safety, shelter, food, and clothing.

Our grants usually range from \$250-\$5000 and are made at the sole discretion of the grants committee, the Key Board, and St. Peter's Vestry. We very much appreciate your generosity and willingness in supporting The Key and our ability to provide grants

to organizations such as Vera House and Caz Cares with revenues, especially from donations.

Diocesan News



The General Convention

The General Convention is the national legislative body of the Episcopal Church. It consists of a House of Bishops, which includes all active and retired bishops, and a House of Deputies, which includes four lay persons and four clergy from each diocese, each area mission, and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe. The Convention meets every three years. The Houses meet and act separately, and both must concur to adopt legislation. The General Convention alone has authority to amend the Prayer Book and the church's Constitution, to amend the canons (laws) of the church, and to determine the program and budget of the General Convention, including the missionary, educational, and social programs it authorizes. A majority of bishops may request the Presiding Bishop to call a Special General Convention. Special General Conventions met in 1821 and in 1969. The General Convention elects twenty of the forty members of the Executive Council, which administers policy and between the triennial meetings of the General Convention. program From "An Episcopal Dictionary of the Church, A User Friendly Reference for Episcopalians"



The 2022 General Convention was held last month in Baltimore. Bishop Dedee and eight members from our diocese attended the four day long event. One of our delegates, Kate Bell, a member of St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Syracuse, wrote this final report. "In these four days we dealt with over 400 resolutions, plus memorials, amendments, and a ton of Points of Order. We voted to put our efforts and resources into anti-racism, including to do an audit of our various historic moneys and where they came from. How much of what we now have was gained from slave labor? We committed to facing truth about Indigenous Boarding Schools, and begin healing our relationships with Indigenous communities. We voted to invest in bringing people from the margins (or between the bricks) better opportunities for growth and leadership. We Deputies elected as our new President a Latina, and as our new Vice President an Indigenous (female) Priest. By this I mean to say we elected the finest among a rich pool of candidates, and they happened to not be of northern European descent. I am proud of both clauses of that sentence. Now we all have work to do, to work actively for the Kingdom of God-the Jesus Movement. I hope that we have strengthened the structure that supports us. That is holy work. No holier than the work we all do every day, whether we are Bishops, Clergy, or Laity. We are all called to the work of the church."
